## Towards a Clearer NEC Constitution

The GC Model Conference Constitution, which is in GC Working Policy, has the following preamble:

D 20 05 Local Conference Constitution and Bylaws—This model constitution shall be followed by all local conferences. Those sections of the model bylaws that appear in bold print are essential to the unity of the Church worldwide, and shall be included in the bylaws as adopted by each local conference. Other sections of the model bylaws may be modified as set out in Bylaw Article XII, provided they continue to be in full harmony with the provisions of this model. Where specific cases require modification to material in bold print, final approval for such modifications to any material in bold print must be studied and approved by the General Conference Administrative Committee after receiving a recommendation from the division executive committee and the Office of General Counsel. Amendments to the Local Conference Model Constitution shall be made by action of the Executive Committee of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists at any Annual Council of that Committee.

Note: From draft 16 this includes the changes to the Model Constitution Bylaw Article 2, Sections 10 & 11, voted at the October 2019 General Conference Annual Council. They are double underlined in the left-hand column. Deletion highlighted in red.

All delegates appointed to represent the members of this conference at any constituency meeting shall be members in regular standing of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. Not less than seventy percent (70%) of the delegates shall be regular delegates. The combined number of such delegates shall not exceed ten percent (10%) of the total number of delegates.  (3) Such employees holding credentials, ministerial licenses, or commissioned minister licences, issued by this Conference, as may be recommended by the executive committee and accepted by the delegates at the constituency meeting. The number of such delegates shall not exceed twenty percent (20%) of the total number of delegates.  (4) Members of the division executive committee who may be present at any constituency m	A long discussion on the Constitution Committee, together with numerous calculations, led to the conclusion that a capped total delegation of 330 would give a close approximation of what is prescribed by the current constitution. The Executive Committee, or the delegates at the Session, may choose a different number. A local cap will lead to cheaper constituency meetings and, arguably, better democracy (as there will be more "voice time" per delegate). 300 might be reasonable minimum, and 350 a reasonable maximum.  There is some ambiguity in the bold type (highlighted yellow) of the GC model in the "delegates at large" section. We have "ten percent of the total number of delegates otherwise provided for and then "ten percent of the total number of regular delegates provided for herinabove". Relating all numbers to one fixed number (the total number of delegates), removes the ambiguity.  Once we have the number of regular delegates in from the churches, we can easily calculate the maximum numbers allowed in the different categories of "Delegates at Large".  In a "full house" scenario, we could have 232 regular delegates chosen by the churches, leaving a maximum of 98 delegates at large. Of these we have the following:  17 All NEC ExCom Members 33 (max) From BUC & TED ExCom 66 (max) Recommended Employees 33 (max) Other Persons  In the unlikely event that everyone wanted to come, this would give a total of 149 so we would have to cut 51 from either of the two sections which are subject to recommendation by the executive committee: Recommended Employees and Other Persons.  Note: this section was altered by J Surridge on 7 Feb 2020 following advice from GC. Representation from BUC and TED combined into one group, maximum of 10%. This makes the original section 4 unnecessary.  The percentages chosen here should guard against two extremes:  1. The higher levels of the church trying to impose their
